Walk Thru The Bible Primary Schools Presenter

Then we are going to be delivering OT Mini in new schools this year, seeing the story of God's rescue plan reaching more children in and around Peterborough.

Awake My Soul

For the second year running we took a group of 18 to 23 year olds to Letton Hall Stables for a retreat-residential. It was four days away in the delightful Letton Hall surroundings. We had twelve delegates – 6 guys and 6 girls, as well as Matt running things in the background. It was a very chilled and relaxed time, allowing the group lots of time to reflect and encourage one another. We were delighted that Daniel Pritchard, Manager of Letton Hall and (also an accredited Baptist Minister) was able to join us for one of the evening sessions and after a time of worship opened up some key verses from the book of Romans and Galatians on Grace. All we can say is that whilst we have all heard many a sermon on the subject - we got a fresh





revelation of grace in such a freeing way, which led to some great discussions and a wonderful time of prayer as a group. This for many was a special evening with one member of the group saying it was one of their highlights of the retreat, describing it as giving them "a new perspective on life". Other quotes on the highlights of the week are:

He encouraged us to know that we all have a story to share and how God wants to use these to extend his story into the lives of others and change history!





CROPS Mentoring With Chris Wild

It has been fantastic to see so many people rising to the challenge and getting involved in our mentoring project since the last newsletter. We have had a steady supply of applications to be mentors that has resulted in us running several training courses throughout the last two terms. This means we now have a team of 12 mentors ready to go out into schools this term.

During the summer term five of our current mentor team continued mentoring in Nene Park Academy, Orton Bushfield Academy and Jack Hunt School. To date we have had the privilege of mentoring 40 different students and completing over 200 different mentoring sessions in this calendar year.

Our mentors have supported some amazing young people who are going through immensely difficult times, but we've also supported some really difficult young people who are facing big challenges. The young people we meet



who are struggling in schools are very different. We meet many who are on their last chance before exclusion, whose behaviour at school isn't good. And yet the background to their situations is very similar. There is usually always a heartbreaking backdrop to the current story of these young lives.

Building on this great start we are also starting mentoring, this autumn term, in The King's School, Thomas Deacon Academy and Stanground College. These are very new relationships with schools so we are very much praying for a smooth start to be made and logistics to be sorted out quickly.

It is great to encourage people by sharing personal stories of how our mentoring scheme is making a difference in students' lives, but the sensitive nature of the work means this can be hard to do whilst maintaining the confidentiality needed to make the project effective. We do however want to share some of the situations our mentors have been involved with recently.

In this last two terms many of the issues our young people are facing have 'home' as a common theme. Home should be our safe space, a base from which we go out and explore the world, especially for young people who are finding their identities. Our mentors have spent time supporting students who have been running away from home and the police who are searching for them, students who 'sofa surf' as the location of home changes



far too regularly. Students who have come home to find out their only parent have been put in prison and temporary accommodation has needed to be found. Our mentors have sat with students and helped give them the confidence to make the decision they want to make as they choose which parents' home to live in from now onwards. Another student regularly witnesses domestic abuse at home and one of our mentors has been there to support them. One student's whole family was evicted from their house for safety when his dad was sent to prison recently. When home is complicated, many students find school complicated too and it is a privilege to be able to support students in these areas of their lives.

As you hear these stories do you find yourself thinking that you'd like to be a listening ear to students like these? Do you know someone who would be a great mentor? Soul Survivor

With Soul Survivor weeks B and C being held at Peterborough for the first time, we believed it was too good an opportunity to miss to raise the profile of CROPS. We had a stand in the Toolshed for both weeks. We had a number of enthusiastic team of CROPS exhibitors able to share about the work including Kat Wade, Sammy Millar, Nigel Taylor, Nathanael, Chris and Matt. We were able to distribute 1,600 CROPS wristbands to passing visitors including young people as well as youth leaders from local churches and further afield. We were able to connect with people from a wider local area who did not already know about CROPS and spread knowledge of schools work, of our gap years and events that we run. It was a beneficial time and we are looking at doing it again next summer, watch this space!





A little goes a long way...

It was first thing on Monday morning, I was due to do an assembly. My oldest daughter was feeling ill and not wanting to go to school. I had agreed to swap in to do this particular assembly only two days earlier. I was not feeling very ready. I went to do the assembly. I was weak that morning and left the school feeling frustrated with myself, unsure if I had done a good job. I thought I had not explained the Bible story very well or thought it all out as well as I should.

Later that day, as I returned to run the lunch club, an adult stopped me in the corridor. She had been in my assembly that morning and said, 'that was just what I needed to hear today'. I was blown away with God's grace; that He can speak through and use our weaknesses and best attempts on a bad day. I learnt that obedience is better than a polished performance and authenticity is more important than having all the loose ends neatly tied up. That bit of encouragement made all the difference to me that day. Thank you to all those at William Law CE Primary who support and encourage me!

A Wonderful Welcome

'You must have made an impact on one of the pupils because after last lesson she went to the library to get a Bible out,' Richard Kean and I were told as we arrived for our second OT Mini lesson at **Sawtry Junior Academy**. We had a lovely few weeks teaching 45 children the outline of the Old Testament in Sawtry, which was a new school for us to visit this year.

'Bible Superheroes' was **Eye CE Primary School's** assembly theme for the summer and I was asked to present

two of them. They had already heard about some Old Testament characters like Samson with his super strength so I decided to focus on the New Testament. We discovered that Jesus was a 'Transformer' (NOT a robot in disguise) but able to forgive the sins of the paralysed man, enable him to walk and transform his life inside and out. Banana-man also made an appearance in the second assembly as we discovered that not all superheroes could save the world on their own- they need strength and help from elsewhere. We re-enacted the storm and shipwreck of the apostle Paul and discovered that his super plan to get to Rome (given by God), super knowledge about the storm coming (he was warned by God) and super wisdom in listening to God led to the lives of everyone on the ship being saved and lots of people on Malta being healed by God too. In fact I enjoyed this assembly so much that Nathanael and I also took it to Farcet CE Primary a week later.

I have been taking **New Testament Bible Explorer** lessons into Eye Primary this half term as well as joining Richard Kean for his OT Mini lessons at Farcet CE Primary School. NT Mini will replace the Bible Explorer lessons from September so it is the last time that I teach this particular series of lessons (although



I'm sure the best bits will find their way into the new ones ready for September!) I'm really looking forward to the next academic year when Richard will also be offering OT Mini lessons as I develop the new NT Mini series.



It's Your Move

We had another hectic term fitting in many 'It's Your Move' (IYM) lessons! Written by Scripture Union for Year 6 children in primary schools it is a wonderful resource that explores how they are feeling about moving to secondary school. This year we took IYM into 15 schools across the city, speaking to approximately 700 children! A special part of the lesson is at the end where we look at Psalm 139 'You know when I sit or stand, you see me when I travel and rest at home.'It's a wonderful opportunity to share how in starting secondary school, and all the ups and downs that children will face, that God knows them and created them and wants to be their friend guiding them through school. A big thanks to all who helped deliver the lessons. Beyond the CROPS team, there were a number of students and past gappers: Andrew Henry, Kat Wade, Rachel Cawston, Sam Higgins, Sammy Miller, Honour Smith, and Lizzy Steele.



Secondary Schools Work

As well as our mentoring work in a wide range of secondary schools we also continue to lead assemblies, lunch clubs, RE days and other opportunities.

Lunchtime clubs and Chaplaincy work

Three lunchtimes a week we are in secondary schools providing spaces for young people to explore faith, have fun with friends playing games, find emotional support and develop social skills, or just catching up with the CROPS team. For the many young people that come to these opportunities that we run at **Ormiston** Bushfield Academy, The King's School and at Peterborough Regional **College** – they are the highlight of their week and so often a safe space in a hectic and frenetic school environment with the pressures of friendships. studies and tests, and just growing up! We realize this is as much the work of the kingdom as anything we do - and its so great to each week pick up the relationships and continue chats and discussions, and find out what has been happening (and occasionally drop in to conversations words of wisdom and encouragement!).

Nene Park Academy

Back in April we ran a week of assemblies using the film *Star Wars: The Force Awakens*, challenging the young people to do the right thing even when it isn't popular. We related this to two heroes in the Bible, Daniel and Paul who stood up for what they believed even when it wasn't popular. The challenge was to be courageous in even small situations.

Stamford Welland Academy

In July we ran a day of Breathe at Stamford Welland Academy for Year 8

pupils. They had a great time reflecting on God and the bigger picture and how Christians grapple with ultimate questions. Some of the written feedback after the session about Breathe included:

It's amazing how this resource continues to help young people to consider questions that may previously have been unasked, as well as impacting their well being.

The King's School

Towards the end of term Matt, Chris and Nathanael led 2x different Christianity workshops over two days for The King's School at **Ely Cathedral** as part of their activities week. Matt led Breathe, with Chris and Nathanael leading our Psalms based art workshop. King's







School have invited us to run these for the last 6 years and this year it was the last time we will have worked with Rev. Ian Forsyth, head of Religious Studies at King's. At the end of July Ian left teaching to go back into Baptist ministry taking on the leadership of a church near Guildford. We want to say a special thank you to Ian for all his support of CROPS over the years in school, but also out of school with the years he served as a trustee of CROPS.

We felt that these two days were a great success. Feedback was that the Year 8 students found the activities thought provoking and creative, and a unique part of their activities week.

Matt was also invited to speak in a whole-school assembly in July on the theme of *David and Goliath*. He opened up the story and also shared an anecdote about a man dressed in a gorilla's suit, pretending to be something he wasn't (with a humorous ending!). Matt challenged the students and staff to think about who the real hero in the Goliath story was. So often we think we should be David in the story, wanting to be the hero – trying to get rid of the Goliaths of sin, etc in our lives, when Jesus already has done this and won the victory.

We also found time this term to lead **two voluntary worship** sessions in the school prayer room and the highlight being a session on the theme of forgiveness. We created our own prayer station with an audio reflection we had recorded loaded onto mp3 players for students to be guided by in their response to Jesus.
